Today Oonagh is a happy girl, often found napping on her favorite cat tree with her feline siblings or receiving pets from her doting human mom. A year ago Oonagh's life looked drastically different.

Oonagh's journey began on the other side of the world. She spent her first three years on a South Korean dog meat farm. Rescued through a network of transports, Oonagh made her way to NCAL on Valentine's Day, in search of love. Because of her history, Oonagh simply did not understand life as a pet. NCAL's most fearful and undersocialized intake to date, she hardly stepped outside her crate or allowed human contact. NCAL staff worked to help her gain confidence with support from a behaviorist. After four months, Oonagh still had a ways to go, but was ready to join the right family who would help her get there. Luckily, she won the heart of her meant-to-be human, Briana Bird, through a Facebook video. Briana says:

"I knew that with time, patience and love I could win her over."

Briana's gentle approach helps Oonagh come out of her shell each day. Briana can now pet her and pick her up! Oonagh and Briana's favorite pastime is reading. "We both love story time. I think that was one of the things that first put her at ease." Briana says she is glad to be a part of Oonagh's journey. "It's rewarding to see her smiles and growing confidence – it makes me so happy."

If Briana could give one message, it would be not to shy away from adopting a pet with special needs. "It might take more time, but the bond you build and the love you receive back is so worth it."

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Step 1 - Search or Visit

Step 3 - Schedule

After submitting your questionnaire, **schedule a Meet & Greet** with an available animal, by calling or emailing.

Step 4 - Meet

It's time to **meet the animals!** Meet & Greet
appointments are 1-hour
for dogs and 30-minutes

Step 5 - Adopt

If you **decide to adopt**, you may adopt that same day or place a \$50 deposit to hold the animal until the end of the next business day.



Pet Adoption Center Fully Reopens!


The start of fall brought welcome change. Our Pet Adoption Center was getting ready to fully reopen in the spring after operating under a limited access model during the past couple years of the pandemic. But another unexpected setback occurred. A canine distemper outbreak forced us to quarantine and fully close our dog kennels for nearly six months. By September, thanks to due diligence, all dogs were cleared of the virus and we were ready to start operating at a full capacity again taking in and adopting out dogs and cats. On September 17th, our Pet Adoption Center had its grand reopening with over 70 guests stopping by and 20 of the 43 animals in our facility getting adopted in four hours!

A CHANGE IN 'CATTITUDE'

Feral Tomcat Becomes a Poster Boy for FIV+ Cats

Just nine months ago, Wallace was living in a feral cat colony, persevering with an injury and sickness as a matter of survival. Rescued during a local Trap-Neuter-Release (TNR) mission, he was brought to NCAL, where he was discovered with a bite wound of unknown origin and quarantined for four months to ensure that he had not been exposed to rabies. Wallace received treatment to heal his wound and was also diagnosed with Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (FIV). Often stigmatized, these three letters (FIV) give many adopters pause - until they learn that it is not as scary as it may seem. Yes, the virus can weaken a cat's immune system, but

FIV+ cats can live long, healthy and happy lives just like any other cat as long as they are well-cared for.

The big challenge for Wallace as an FIV+ cat was to give up his adventurous outdoor lifestyle. But thanks to a steady source of nutritious meals, a warm bed, TLC from humans, and toys to play with, this thrill-seeking tomcat became an affectionate indoor kitty and a poster boy for dispelling the stigma of FIV+ cats.

Fast-forward to today, he is bringing warmth and laughter to his forever home in Boston. This awesome guy, who is as loving as he is lovable, is now the apple of his forever mom's eye!

3 Tips to Care for Your Pet's Teeth

Did you know that the majority of our medical fund spending goes towards dental care for animals, especially seniors? Here's three things you can do at home to stay on top of your pet's dental health and oral hygiene:

1. Brush, brush, brush!
Brushing your pet's teeth
regularly with a petspecific, enzymatic
toothpaste is the best way
to combat plaque build up
and gingivitis.

2. Make safe choices for chewers.

Chewing on items that are harder than tooth enamel (such as antlers and marrow bones) can result in a fractured tooth. Visit VOHC.org for safer alternatives.

3. Schedule a check up.

Your pet's teeth and gums should be examined at least once a year by your veterinarian to check for early signs of a problem and to keep your pet's mouth healthy.

How do Horses Communicate?

Ears: Forward ears mean they are alert and interested, or they may be nervous of something looming ahead. Floppy or droopy ears is a telltale sign of a relaxed horse, and ears flattened backwards mean they are angry. One ear forward towards you while another points elsewhere shows they are listening to you while surveying other noises.

Eyes: The eyes are a window into a horses' soul, just as with humans. When a horse is scared, their eyes are wide (the whites of the eyes may show), and when a horse is relaxed, the eyes are "soft".

Tail: Relaxed horses will have tails hanging low and limp. Scared or excited ones will carry their tails high.

Body: Tense horses carry their necks high; scared ones move theirs rapidly. Horses that are relaxed carry their heads low, and have nice, fluid movement.

Face: Spend some time looking at how horses' faces look when they are relaxed. Horses that are feeling unwell or irritated look tense in their faces, while happy horses look relaxed. Fun fact: horses look at our faces when trying to read our moods, too!



THERAPUTIC BENEFITS OF HORSES

The Raw-Yet-Unquantifiable Lessons Only Horses Can Teach

First-time riders at the NCAL Equine Center often start nervous. Sure, a horse is MUCH bigger and seemingly more intimidating than a regular household pet. But by the end of their first lesson, our instructors witness riders realizing that in reality, horses are soothing, gentle animals. That they may not talk, but they speak to us in a multitude of ways - their behavior is straightforward and their magic undeniable.

"Spending time with horses teaches trust, patience, intuition, the art of silent communication, responsibility, and leadership," says Kim Stinson, Equine Center Director. "Being around horses increases confidence, and provides opportunities for socialization with people too. Horseback riding is great exercise and releases a hormone called serotonin, which reduces stress. Our programs offer the opportunity to experience a meaningful connection with horses and acquire fundamental skills to build upon."



Take the mom-daughter duo, Jessica and Lili Spaulding, for example. Jessica began volunteering at the Equine Center in September after falling in love with the horses and the barn environment while accompanying Lili to her riding lessons. "For Lili, working with horses has been balancing and calming," says Jessica. "Kids need an outlet. Being with horses allows her to transfer her energy in a way that benefits her. After being here with Lili, I thought this place was amazing and started volunteering. Every person is smiling because the barn exudes happiness. It gives Lili and I a chance to develop a relationship with the horses as well as with NCAL's mission."

In no time, both Lili and Jessica have become regular faces at the Equine Center - a common theme for many who set foot in the facility. In the safe environment of the barn and under the guidance of our experienced instructors, clients develop practical horsemanship skills. But what is most important, is the raw-yet-unquantifiable lessons they learn... of facing their fears, becoming more self-aware based on how horses mirror their emotions, and consequently understanding how their behavior impacts others and the world around them.

"I may be the smallest member of NCAL's horse family, but I am here with my big personality to prove that the best things in life do come in small packages.
